

Christian Response to Covid-19

Covid-19 has touched the whole world; its intrusion has put our lives on hold. So swiftly it travelled the earth's land and sea and covered the world's vast geography. It knows no geographical boundary, be it the busy urban or the quiet rural. This global pandemic is not a respecter of person.

It does not distinguish any racial or ethnic association. It had stricken the prince living in the fortified

palace but also the pauper in his crumbling shack. It has harmed the skilled doctor and health practitioner as well as the unskilled laborer. The invisible enemy has visited and frightened the powerful and the same it did to the helpless homeless man. The enemy wreaked havoc on the economy – the big money affairs of the rich and the small wage of the irregular employee. The Corona Virus has put the world to a screeching halt, leaving them dismayed and shocked-wondering when normal life will be back.Governments have turned their eyes towards the needy and homeless and for once provided shelter, food and health facilities for them. A great equalizer, that's what Corona Virus proved to be. Rich or poor, prominent or unknown, male or female, young or old, prince or pauper. It doesn't really matter.

Covid-19 can officially be added to the list of small things that have caused great upheaval. Since its

As Covid-19 sweeps across the world, how should Christians respond?

I believe that, as Christians there are a number of specific responses that we can, and should make:

Don't panic or despair


First and most importantly, don't panic. There are more than enough "chicken littles" running around proclaiming doom and gloom, and there are many false prophets proclaiming this and that.

I believe that it is important during this time that we realize that God is still sovereign. He is in Control. Nothing that is happening is a surprise to Him. be that you can do their shopping for them. Or potentially help them with maintaining the

exterior of their houses and yards.

Take the Opportunity to develop Your Own Spiritual Life You may find it challenging if you are among the many who find yourself spending more time at home than you are accustomed to. If you are in that position, take advantage of the opportunity to spend more time in personal development. You can read a book. Explore a field that you find interesting. Invest time in your family. There are countless things that you can do with your newly found free time.

Maybe the most important thing you can do is to take advantage of the opportunity to grow

spiritually. Christians often express that life is too busy to spend much time in prayer and Bible study. But, if you are one of those "stuck at home," this is an ideal opportunity to invest in your spiritual life. Pray. Read the Bible. Pray some more. Meditate on what you are reading. Read a book on spiritual disciplines or Spirit of Prophecy. Pray some more. Seek the Lord and his will for your life. Above all, don't let this time go to waste.



Show Respect for Our Government Leaders

It seems that many, including believers, are enjoying criticizing our government and those who serve in it. Some today are crying that the government is responding too slowly or not strongly enough to this crisis.

Others are crying that the government is overstepping its proper bounds, claiming more and more power over ordinary citizens. I have heard many Christians on Facebook deploring the government's ban on churches gathering to worship and refusing to follow that directive.

But this type of courage is foolishness, and this blind courage—even when recast under Christian terminology (such as "trusting the Lord") is not a biblical virtue. In the Bible, courage works closely with wisdom and love, and trust works closely with knowledge.

Biblical courage is often quiet and unassuming, relying on God's promises, desperately depending on God's grace, and working in obedience to God's commandments for his glory and the welfare of our neighbor.

However, I believe that we should be in submission to our governments during this time. Firstly, because Scripture instructs us to be in submission to them (Romans 13:1), but, just as importantly, because the only known way to keep this virus from spreading is to maintain our distance from each other. When we gather together, we just help it to spread even more and we put more people at risk who are vulnerable to this disease.



So, follow the appropriate government guidelines. Maintain your distance. Wash your hands frequently. Work from home, if possible. Be an example to others around you.

Stay in Touch with Family, Friends, and the Church

One of the challenges that many are facing now is being isolated from other people. If you are on the extreme end of the introvert scale, this may not be a big deal. But for most people extended isolation can be very challenging.

During this time, look for opportunities to stay in touch. Nothing can replace face to face contact and human touch, but many of us today live in a very connected world. We can text, chat, email, talk on the phone, make video calls, attend virtual worship services and Bible studies, and more. Of course, not everyone can do all of that, but most of us can do at least some of it. So, take advantage of the available technology.

Stay in touch with the other people in your normal circle of family and friends.

Without a doubt, the loss of life and suffering caused by COVID-19 is tragic. Before it runs its course, it will have likely touched everyone in the world to one extent or another. But, as Christians, our response does not need to mirror the unrest and despair that those around us exhibit.

We have a hope that transcends this world and our circumstances. We can rejoice, not in the tragic events unfolding around us, but in the God who can use them to accomplish his purpose in our lives and in this world.

During this time of darkness, be a light. Let your light so shine that it will glorify God, drawing others to find their hope and fullness in the Only One who truly transcends the struggles of this life. "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-19).

COVID -19 'Unlocking' South Africa's economy - different perspectives

Covid-19 verses SA Economy: On 8 May 2020 Minister Patel addressed a meeting of about 100 CEOs convened by BLSA, where he stated that the pandemic was likely to have a devastating effect on the economy, though the extent of the damage was not yet clear; that many firms in South Africa were in difficulty as a result of the current circumstances and millions of workers were without an income. The Department would like to reiterate that Minister Patel has consistently put forward the view on the devastating impact of COVID-19 on the SA economy since the declaration of the national disaster.

He pointed out already on 24 March 2020 at a media briefing that the pandemic will put a strain on the economy, including small business owners and ordinary citizens.

SPIRITUALITY

The <u>COVID-19 pandemic</u> has impacted religion in various ways, including the cancellation of the worship services of various faiths, the closure of <u>Sabbath Schools</u>, as well as the cancellation of <u>pilgrimages</u> surrounding observances and festivals. Many churches, synagogues, mosques, and temples have offered worship through <u>livestream</u> amidst the pandemic.

Relief wings of religious organizations have dispatched disinfection supplies, powered air-purifying respirators, face shields, gloves, coronavirus nucleic acid detection reagents, ventilators, patient monitors, syringe pumps, infusion pumps, and food to affected areas. Other churches have offered free <u>COVID-19 testing</u> to the public. Adherents of many religions have gathered together to pray for an end to the COVID-19 pandemic, for those affected by it, as well as for wisdom for physicians and scientists to combat the disease.

Christianity for Seventh Day Adventist

It's very likely that millions of Seventh-day Adventists church members are also affected. According to media reports, most people staying home are still working regular hours, so it does not mean they're on vacation or have suddenly many hours to spare. For many, however, saving daily commuting time and the usual time they used to spend with other errands may mean they have some extra hours on their hands.

1. Be thankful. Chances are, the quarantine has affected your personal and family daily routine. Both in your personal and your family life, however, make a point of being thankful for what you have and not complain about what you lack. It's something that implies accepting that even in the best of cases, life is full of ups and downs. Every day, however, presents a new opportunity. As an old saying goes, "Those who see the glass half empty or half full miss the point. The glass is refillable." Or as the prophet Jeremiah put it following the experience of Jerusalem's destruction, "God's compassions fail not. They are new every morning" (Lam. 3:22, 23). Thank God for such a blessing.

2. Memorize Scripture, the "old-fashioned" way. In moments of crisis, we have traditionally been told to claim God's promises. At the same time, sudden world developments such as the COVID-19 crisis may help us envision a time when we may not have free, unrestricted access to God's Word.

3. Enlarge your list of prayer requests. As a Seventh-day Adventist, you are already praying for those affected by the pandemic and their close relatives. Now it's time to enlarge your list.

4. Acquire a new Hobby. It could be learning a new language to scrap-booking or cooking for some of us.

5. Take some time for solo or family singing. Singing can be a powerful tool to fight discouragement and lift our spirits. When living on this earth, Jesus "held communion with heaven in song; and as His companions complained of weariness from labor, they were cheered by the sweet melody from His lips.

6. Hold more conversations with your children. Now is as good a time as any to have those conversations you were putting off.

7. Make at least one specific positive change to your health.

Make the decision to use at least part of the time saved to make a positive change to your health. Choose your food more carefully. Sleep one more hour. Increase your physical exercise time.

8. Do not overlook church services. Even though most in-person church services have been canceled or moved online, church service time should still be used to gather, praise, and study God's Word. Do not assume that because "there's no church," you have more time to spend on other

pursuits. Watch a church service online at regular times, especially on the Sabbath.

9. Ask God to give you peace of mind and balance. At a time when thousands have turned to social media to post anything from flat-out denials to startling conspiracy theories, ask God to help you stay balanced and positive. Claim the promise that He "will keep . . . in perfect peace" those who keep trusting Him (Isa. 26:3). We are merely witnessing Bible prophecy being

Fulfilled before our eyes.

10. Renew your commitment to Jesus and His church. Use this period of relative confinement to renew your resolve to be faithful, even unto death (Rev. 2:10). If you have not done it before, commit to being a proactive and positive influence in your neighborhood and local church. Get involved in doing something for Jesus "while it is day"

(John 9:4). And yes, "look up and lift up your head, because your redemption draws near"

(<u>Luke 21:28</u>).

Response and impact

The most dramatic result (in religion) has been the exceedingly quick shift of religious services from in-person to online worship. While for almost a hundred years, churches have used various communication methods to reach their audiences, such as radio, television and online media, halting of in-person worship "is one of the most significant sudden disruptions in the practice of religion throughout the world not only South Africa.

A <u>Pew Research</u> report from March 2020 reported a change in their religious habits due to the pandemic. People have pulled together as never before and live streamed online services. Many respondents said that they have "prayed for an end to the spread of coronavirus," "attended services in person less often," and "watched religious services online or on TV instead of in person As to whether the crisis had an effect on long-term personal religious life, 19% of said that their faith as strengthened and only 3% said that it got worse.

Food and medical assistance

This situation calls on our solidarity and accountability, mindfulness, care and wisdom and most of all love for one another. As well as for our signs of faith, hope and love "Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, some churches continue to operate their <u>Welfare</u> Departments offering bags filled with necessities to needy families.

The Seventh Day Adventist Church has distributed many a food parcels with financial aid from Meals on Wheels to many a door. Sometimes getting there just in a time when the family thought they would sleep hungry today. We have prayed with families, we have cried with families, we have stood in times destitute and utmost despair with families and now we stand in faith and hope that God is our delivery.

Protocols to be adhered to

All COVID-19 health and safety protocols must be followed at all times in and around my vicinity besides the world at large, including observance of guidelines for social distancing, sanitation and hygiene, and use of appropriate personal protective equipment, like cloth face masks, as determined by the National Department of Health People may travel to perform and acquire services only where such services cannot be provided from the safety of one's home

1. Interprovincial travel is not permitted except to return to work with proof of employment; for movement of learners, with permit; in exceptional circumstances such as funerals (with approval) or essential services.

- 2. Stay at home, other than essential travel for work and to purchase essential goods.
- 3. No recreational travel or to meet friends or family.

4. Mandatory use of cloth masks (including home-made ones to cover nose and mask) and ensure hand hygiene when in public and at workplace.

- 5. Emergencies for medical reasons.
- 6. Those who have an exemption to travel for funerals
- 7. South Africans returning home and foreign nationals leaving South Africa

8. Elderly and persons with co-morbidities are encouraged to self-isolate and only leave home for exceptional reasons.

9. Social distancing (2m away from other persons) to be applied in public

when, shopping, and visiting health facilities (pharmacies, clinics etc.)

10. Social distancing when using public and private transport, as per transport guidelines

11. All public gatherings are prohibited.

12. Stores to ensure that there is temperature screening of patrons, hand

sanitizers available and measures to facilitate social distancing. Where the number of customers cannot be accommodated at once then measures such a ticket system and defined limit of time in the store per customer should be implemented instead of the physical queuing of customers.

13. Curfews will be implemented between 8pm and 5am, unless for essential service workers returning from or going to work

Choosing Christ When It Is Easier to Choose The World.

n Sunday, 15 March 2020 President Ramaphosa declared a "national state of disaster" in South Africa. The country has since implemented various preventative measures starting with a prohibition on meetings of more than 100 people and social distancing to a lockdown due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The Impact of the Lockdown

All places of worship have been forced to close. Our churches were not exempt. The coronavirus pandemic has impacted our church in various ways, including the cancellation of the Sabbath worship services, Regional Camp meetings, and Regional Pathfinder events like our East Rand Region Bible Quiz. Other programs were postponed to later dates in the year.

The reaction from some of our church members was initially one of agitation. Some saw this lockdown as a direct attack on the church, but one argues that all people and all persuasions were affected. Our church was not singled out.

Solutions to Mitigate the Effects of the Lockdown

Our church leaders have since resorted to social media to stream services online. This has allowed us to continue to practice our faith in a way that's safe and socially responsible. People have never been more spiritual than they are during this lock down. From being mere attendees of church on Sabbath, most people have become Bible scholars of note. They have daily worship and are studying more their Bibles. This is seen in the various chat groups as the scriptural discussion unfold.

Our Pathfinder Clubs are the most affected by this lockdown because by nature, most of our activities require our physical presence in one place. Armed with a mobile phone and help from young IT Junior Ministries Leaders, our creative Northern Conference Director, Pastor Ndaba Mvelase has resorted to setting up an App for dissemination of information. The App is still being developed. "Good morning elder the impact is both positive and negative. I get to spend time with my family which is very rare. This is the biggest positive. Negatively we have had to postpone and or cancel some of our programs. But we are also finding new ways to do ministry like one line" says the modest Pastor Ndaba Mvelase.

He has enlisted the services of his Junior Youth Ministries Committee to record short videos spanning from Adventurer curriculum, to Pathfinder curriculum and honours. He has been posting these videos on YouTube and distributing the links to the leadership.

Effects of Lockdown and Solutions

The Junior Ministries leaders in East Rand Region have attested to these initiatives as very effective. Most leaders are however unable to determine the actual participation of their little candidates with regards to the curriculum. The leaders in Training were however very positive about the communication so far via social media even though further options were suggested such as virtual classrooms to cover their compulsory seminars. Delivery of such virtual seminars is yet to be exhaustively researched to establish most effective knowledge transfer methods. Physical classroom delivery of seminars was singled out as still being the most preferred method for leadership learning.

Other constraints of online knowledge transfer are a lack of resources for most of our less privileged leaders and children alike. The access to electronic gadgets such as cell phones and computers as well as the prohibitive cost of data are a contributory factor. Notwithstanding most leaders agree that online is the most effective way of counter acting the current covid-19 lockdown's effects on delivering the pathfinder and leadership curriculums.

Melusi Manzini a leadership candidate argues, "In light of the above discussions I propose that we look at those elements that are doable using online tools (at a cost that is affordable to the least of us) and we do those. Then those that need face to face and the practical elements be done after lockdown. The most important thing is to be as much considerate to those who cannot afford the online tools because of the cost elements associated with them."

Another leadership candidate shared her thoughts, "The social media has assisted cause examples of the work we should do as well as books we should read are being shared on the relevant platforms, the only drawback is if some people don't have up to date software to make use of the media or in some cases if some people don't have an adequate budget for the data needed to successfully download the media being shared in the groups."

So clearly our efforts of disseminating information and employing e-learning are being frustrated by economic variables. Some people lost their income as a result of the national lockdown, while others have limited financial resources, others have no appropriate electronic equipment. A parent added, "For those who can access social media, it makes life easy, my kids are using it for school work and it is amazing; they use Zoom cloud meetings."

The corona virus risk is greater in poor communities, many of which do not have access to safe and clean drinking water, and who are forced by circumstances to live in close proximity to others. Asking them for participation in elearning may be farfetched.

Paul in his letter to the Romans in Chapter 13 verses 1 and 2 says, "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation."

This is a Biblical call for all of us regardless of our circumstances to listen to our leaders in this difficult time of covid-19 outbreak. Choose Christ, stay home, stay safe and be blessed.






